

Academic Artifact Guidelines

General Info:

Two per year. Student works produced as a result of classroom work. These artifacts should reflect a high level of performance and personal growth.

Examples: Photos of projects/artwork.

Paper/essays.

Video/audios of presentation/speech/performance.

Computer programs/CD.

Projects.

Tests or documentation certificate.

The Paragraph:

1. Identify the purpose of the artifact.
2. Point out the parts of the artifact which especially reflects quality.
3. Explain how this artifact fits into the whole portfolio.
4. Must be typed, on white paper, with no errors, in complete sentences. Be sure to include your name, grade, and date on the top of the artifact.
